We recently replaced our front door of 30+ years. Even though it was a much-needed upgrade, I couldn't help but think of all that door has witnessed over the years. It has fulfilled its duty of keeping out the elements and making us feel safe. It has been a portal into our home of good things and a few not so good things. It has welcomed visitors, received much-awaited packages, witnessed babies brought home from the hospital and later, those same babies leaving home. It has brought messengers with good news and sad news. It has been forcefully shut a few times over the years in irritation, annoyance, and impatience. But mostly it has been our magic door leading into our haven, our home. Even on the worst of days, the sight of it was the first signal of home offering a warm and comforting feeling that washed over me.

The sound of the door's opening has been most welcome and calming to a worried farm wife wondering if she should go check on her husband or a nervous mother awaiting the arrival of her teens home safe and sound. It has witnessed homecomings, college friend get togethers, countless family gatherings, and a surprise visitor now and then. This well-loved, overused door has been privy to every one of our comings and goings for three decades. Melancholy creeped in looking at it leaning against our garage wall awaiting repurposing for an old granary workshop.

As I glanced at this worn door while admiring the new one, I thought of common sayings such as door of opportunity and When one door closes, another opens. But what does the Bible have to say about doors? Let's turn to some scripture.

"Ask and it will be given to you; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you. For everyone who asks receives; the one who seeks finds; and to the one who knocks, the door will be opened." ~Matthew 7:7-8

"I know your works. Behold, I have set before you an open door, which no one is able to shut. I know that you have but little power, and yet you have kept my word and have not denied my name." ~Revelation 3:8


"I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will come in to him and eat with him, and he with me."



Who Is Our Neighbor?

The theme of the 2024 Assembly was Connected and focused on our Neighbors in Solidarity. Solidarity is a commitment with others and a way of seeing, being, and acting. Solidarity means seeing and experiencing one's own well-being as connected to the well-being of others and the communities to which they belong. Solidarity often involves people aligning themselves with others who do not have the same experiences. The principle of solidarity compels respect for the lived experience of all our brothers and sisters. Solidarity encourages us to share in our neighbor's suffering and to participate in their liberation.

Across the South Dakota Synod, we have many specialized or supported ministries. Each of these ministries proclaims the Gospel and carries out the mission of our church in a specific way - sometimes working with those who have no home, sometimes building a new faith community, sometimes working with prisoners. We call these ministries "Neighbors in Solidarity" to celebrate that their work is our work, too. Jesus calls us to imagine our neighbors in a broad sense, and we stand together - in solidarity - with these ministries to share the love of Christ. These ministries are your ministries, because we are the body of Christ together.

Our Neighbors in Solidarity include:

Church in RC *Companion synods in Cameroon and Nicaragua (funded through SD Synod **Companion Synods**

Christ accompanies us on our journey through prayer. God is always there for us. Regular prayer engages us with God's presence and God's reconciling mission. Pray about your role in God's Mission in the world, and more specifically in South Dakota.

LEARN

Learn about the ministries, the people impacted by these ministries and consider what your role might be in standing in solidarity with your brothers and sisters in Christ. Listen and share stories of others as a way of building relationships.

ACT!

We can share our resources: money, time, and expertise. We can become an ally, working to equip ourselves and our neighbors. God invites us all to the table and then sends us to share and serve each other.

36th Annual Synod Assembly

There are 200 congregations in our synod.

Friday's attendance was 342. Saturday's attendance was slightly less than that.

Questions posed from panel discussions:

*Do you ask your students what role does their faith play in choosing a college?

*How does a resurrected Christ change your life?

*What is God doing? How can we be a part of it considering our passions, gifts/abilities, and community needs?

Box Elder will be the site of a synodauthorized worshipping community. They will receive \$20,000 from Churchwide.

34 percent of congregations exceeded their mission support commitments.

October 16th is World Hunger

Sunday. This year is the 50th anniversary of ELCA World Hunger.

Pastor Alan Blankenfeld resigned and has accepted a part-time position with Messiah Lutheran of Flandreau.

Through the Lilly grant, 1 rural ministry director will be hired as well as 2 liasons. Other states are looking to SD as a model for addressing rural ministry issues.

RURAL MINISTRY AND SUIDICE PREVENTION

These statistics and excerped thoughts were shared by Pastor Janet Miller while being involved in a 6-week class.

*Farmers and those who work around them are 2 to 3.5 times more likely to commit suicide than any other professions.

*14.5% of all farmers in America will die of suicide. That comes to over 50,000 suicides a year.

*75% of those suicides are men but of the women farmers there is the highest suicide attempts in the nation.

*The suicide rate for farmers has increased by 30% since the year 2000.

Living in a rural community, we need to be aware that these statistics reflect our neighbors, friends, families, and us.

When dealing with people who are suffering from depression and suicidal thoughts, things can seem really overwhelming, leaving us feeling helpless. Although we are not called to cure, we can provide a safe place for someone to lay his/her burden down and rest. Providing a meal, a caring touch, or a listening ear are small things we can do for those suffering. Your small thing and God's big presence can be a reason to face one more day....and sometimes what is needed is that reason to hope. As disciples of Christ, we can bring God's hope to the hurting.

From Kristi - It hurts my heart that people don't feel they can talk about their mental struggles the same as physical struggles. This needs to change! It is not a sign of weakness; we are called to walk beside each other in our struggles and our joys. It's OK to not be OK at times! Please reach out! You are precious in the sight of the Lord!
